

DISENCULTURATION

GETTING STARTED...

The task of the missionary is to communicate the gospel accurately and contextually. Hudson Taylor is a great example of this. He brought the gospel message but discerned what was biblical Christianity and what was cultural baggage. Unlike other British missionaries of his day, he did not require converts to dress in the style of western Christians, rather, he grew out his hair, put it in a ponytail and dressed in the traditional clothing of the Chinese locals. The question we must ask ourselves is, what is central to the gospel and what is simply cultural clothing that we have dressed it up in?

'Disenculturation' is the task of disentangling the gospel from its more dubious cultural forms and expressions. As Christians in a particular culture it can be hard for us to distinguish between the gospel itself and all the trappings that we assume come along with it but that are actually extrabiblical.

READ THE TEXT: 1 CORINTHIANS 9:20-23

²⁰ To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though not being myself under the law) that I might win those under the law. ²¹ To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (not being outside the law of God but under the law of Christ) that I might win those outside the law. ²² To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. ²³ I do it all for the sake of the gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings.

- 6. What are appropriate ways of using our culture to show the gospel?

- 1. Is there someone you know who is dealing with this issue? How can you be praying and helping them during this time?
- 2. Share and pray for one another in your life group. How can you specifically pray for and encourage one another in response to this text?
