This year marks the 30th anniversary of the World Watch List. While the research methodology has evolved over time, our purpose remains the same – we want to help you understand where your Christian brothers and sisters are suffering for their faith and help you to stand with the parts of the body of Christ that are hurting the most.

Across the world, more than 360 million Christians suffer high to extreme levels of persecution for their faith in Jesus. That's 1 in 7 Christians worldwide.

WHAT IS CHRISTIAN PERSECUTION?

Christian persecution is any hostility experienced because of one's identification with Christ. This definition covers not just violence but also the full range of pressure experienced by Christians because of their faith in Jesus including hostile attitudes, words, and actions.

It can look different in every country, from rejection and isolation, to being denied access to basic needs like water, food, and health care. Some face violent abuse, imprisonment, and even death.

WHAT IS THE WORLD WATCH LIST?

The World Watch List ranks the top 50 countries where it is most difficult to be a Christian. The list is compiled by a group of experts, audited by an external organisation specialising in religious freedom, and checked for transparency. The World Watch List is the best and most authoritative list of its kind

Through on the ground interviews and data analysis, the list provides an accurate picture of the difficulties persecuted Christians face worldwide. For each country, the list looks at the pressure and violence persecuted Christians endure in their public and private lives.

WHAT MAKES THE LIST RELIABLE?

The World Watch List is accepted as an authoritative study and is audited externally each year by the International Institute for Religious Freedom. The research for the World Watch List is undertaken by World Watch Research, the research department of Open Doors International.

The research team consists of one managing director, seven persecution analysts and one editor, all with university degrees. Three of the team have or are completing PhDs. Five are lawyers with experience in the field of human rights, constitutional law, or governance. The persecution analysts collaborate closely with researchers and other experts operating at regional, national, and subnational level.

WHY DOES THE WORLD WATCH LIST MATTER?

In 1 Corinthians 12, we are reminded that when one part of the body of Christ suffers, all parts suffer with it (1 Cor 12:26). The World Watch List helps us to understand where the body of Christ is hurting most. It is the cornerstone of all our work, informing what countries we need to work in to strengthen the Church as they suffer persecution for following Jesus.

WHAT DO THE SCORES MEAN?

Each country's score is determined by measuring the intensity of persecution across two categories; violence and pressure. Pressure is measured in five spheres of life: church, national, community, family, and private. Examples of each have been provided below but are not the only ways Christians experience these types of pressure.

Total persecution score = violence + pressure

Each of these six types of persecution receive equal weighting, and are added together to give a total score out of 100 (rounded to the nearest whole number after ranking).

Violence

Violence is defined as the deprivation of physical freedom or as serious bodily or mental harm to Christians or serious damage to their property and can occur in all spheres of life.

Church Life

The collective exercise by Christians of worship, life, service, and public expression of faith without undue interference. Persecution could involve requiring church registration, monitoring preaching material, harassment of leaders and their families, or restricting the printing or distribution of religious materials.

National Life

The interaction between Christians and the nation they live in, including rights and laws, the justice system, and public life. Persecution in this sphere could look like blasphemy accusations, unequal treatment in court, toleration of public disrespect, travel restrictions, or discrimination by authorities.

Community Life

Involves the workplace, business, health care, education, and local public life and civic order. Persecution in this sphere could include dress codes, monitoring, abduction, restricted access to community resources and/or health care, and employment or education discrimination or disadvantages.

Family Life

How much freedom has been restricted to live out Christian convictions within the family circle. Persecution in this sphere could involve forced allocations of religious identity, weddings, baptisms, burials, adoptions, child rearing, separation of families, pressure to divorce, or inheritance rights.

Private Life

How much freedom is restricted when relating to God one-on-one in their own private space. Persecution in this sphere could restrict private worship, possession of religious material, or freedom of expression.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

North Korea is a brutally hostile place for Christians. If discovered by the authorities, believers are either **sent to labour camps** as political prisoners where the conditions are atrocious, or killed on the spot – and their families will share their fate as well.

Christians have absolutely no freedom. It is almost impossible for believers to gather or meet to worship. Those who dare to meet must do so in **utmost secrecy** – and at enormous risk.

A report issued in 2022 said that Christians are particularly targeted and exposed to **torture** in North Korean prisons. Detention periods and **interrogations** are longer and more intense.

The reason for such extreme persecution is that Christianity is seen as a particular threat to the dictatorial ideology and governance of the country's barbaric regime. Christians are viewed as enemies of both the leadership and society in general.



WHAT'S LIFE LIKE **FOR CHRISTIANS?**

Somalia is a majority Muslim nation, and society expects all Somalis to be Muslim.

The violent insurgent group al Shabaab has repeatedly expressed its desire to eradicate Christians from the country. Christians from Muslim backgrounds are regarded as highvalue targets and may be killed on the spot if discovered.

Christians also face serious persecution from their family and community. Leaving Islam is regarded as a betrayal of the family

and clan, and family members and clan leaders will harass, intimidate, and even kill Somali converts.

Anyone suspected of being a Christian convert is closely monitored. 'Church life' is simply not possible, so the few believers must meet in secret. Islamic extremists have intensified their hunt for Christian leaders.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

It is extremely dangerous to be a Christian in Yemen, due to the strict Islamic laws and the presence of Islamic extremist groups.

The population is overwhelmingly Muslim, and it is illegal to convert from Islam to Christianity. Christian converts are at great **risk of being killed** by their families, clans, and tribes.

Most believers from a Muslim background choose to practise their faith covertly.

They cannot gather because of fear that

neighbours will report them to the local authorities. Displaying Christian symbols could lead to **imprisonment**, **physical abuse**, **or even execution**.

All Yemenis are affected by the humanitarian crisis caused by the ongoing civil war, but Christians are additionally vulnerable since emergency relief is mostly distributed through local Muslims and mosques, which allegedly **discriminate** against all who are not considered to be devout Muslims.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE **FOR CHRISTIANS?**

For 20 years, Eritrea has only recognised three official Christian denominations: Orthodox, Catholic, and Lutheran, and closely monitors these churches.

The authorities perpetuate a stigma against believers and encourage neighbours to spy on and report each other. Those who have become Christians from Muslim backgrounds, or who leave the Eritrean Orthodox Church for a non-traditional church, face extreme pressure and persecution from their own families

and communities.

There are thought to be 1,000 Christians indefinitely detained in Eritrean prisons, not officially charged with anything.

Christian men, women, and children as young as 14 are being conscripted into the armed forces to fight in the conflict in Tigray. There is no time limit on service. Christian prisoners are often 'released' into military service instead of being allowed home.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Libya is effectively a lawless land where both native Christians and those passing through from other countries face extreme

With no central government to maintain law and order, Islamic extremist groups and organised crime groups both wield power. They **target and kidnap Christians**, and some believers have been killed.

If a Libyan from a Muslim background becomes a Christian, they are likely to face intense **pressure and abuse** from their family and the wider community to make them renounce their faith. Those who publicly express their faith and try to share the gospel face **arrest or retribution from extremists.**


Large numbers of refugees from sub-Saharan Africa pass through Libya in an attempt to reach Europe, many of whom are Christians. They are likely to encounter harassment and threats, or to be abducted and used as **slave labour** by organised crime groups.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Violence remains the most prevalent threat in Nigeria. Christians are attacked indiscriminately and brutally in northern Nigeria, and the **violence** has now spread to the south.

Groups such as Boko Haram and Fulani extremists inflict **murder**, physical **injury**, **abduction**, and **sexual violence** on their victims. Christians are dispossessed of their land and their means of livelihood. Many live as internally displaced people or refugees.

Abductions for ransom have increased considerably over recent years, including the abduction of church leaders. Christian women and girls may be subjected to sexual harassment and **forced marriage**.

In the Sharia states of northern Nigeria, Christians face **discrimination** and **exclusion** as second-class citizens. Christians from a Muslim background also face rejection from their own families, pressure to give up Christianity, and often physical violence.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Christians in Pakistan are considered second-class citizens and face discrimination in every aspect of life.

Jobs that are seen as low, dirty, and degrading are reserved for Christians by the authorities, who continue to push them to the margins of society.

Pakistan's notorious **blasphemy laws** target all religious minorities, but affect the Christian minority in particular – roughly a quarter of all blasphemy accusations target Christians, who only make up 1.8% of

the population. The number of blasphemy cases is increasing, as is the number of Christian girls being **abducted**, **abused**, **and forcibly converted** to Islam.

In addition to social hostility, Christians also experience apathy from the authorities who should protect them. The Christian community feels increasingly trapped between Islamic extremist groups that operate in the region, and a government that appeases these groups.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Iran is ruled by an increasingly strict Islamic regime, which views the existence of Iranian **house churches** as an attempt by Western countries to undermine Islam and their authority.

State **surveillance** is on the rise and the authorities are exerting an increasing grip on daily life and activities, an attitude reflected in the harsh responses to the protests that followed the death of Mahsa Amini on 16 September 2022.

When people from Muslim backgrounds become Christians, they can only meet in secret house churches. They are at great risk of being **monitored**, **harassed**, **arrested**, **and prosecuted** for 'crimes against national security' – an accusation that is notoriously poorly defined and can be abused.

Iranian Christians may be banned from education, **lose their jobs**, and find it very difficult to get back into employment. Many believers feel **forced to leave** the country.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

The Taliban's takeover of power has forced most Christians either further **underground** or away from the country entirely. Many (if not all) house groups closed, with believers forced to leave behind everything they own. **Following Jesus remains a death sentence**, if discovered.

The rigid form of society imposed leaves no room for deviation, meaning Christians – almost all of whom are converts from Islam – must keep their faith secret. Leaving Islam is considered **shameful** and punishable

by death under the prevailing Islamic law.

Consequently, Christian converts face **dire and violent consequences** if their new faith is discovered, even from family members who must save their so-called 'honour' by getting rid of them.

Thousands of Afghan **refugees**, including many Christians, are now living in countries bordering Afghanistan, often in poor conditions in camps for displaced people.

HOLDING ON TO JESUS

For Christians in Afghanistan, life is perilous. But believers hold on to Jesus and your support and prayers bring hope.

"The Christian is a 'kafir' – sinner or infidel. If a man is found to be a Christian, they would kill him immediately. And not only him, but his whole family..."

Nilofer, a refugee, is explaining the horrific cost of following Jesus in her homeland, Afghanistan. She's one of many believers who fled when the Taliban swept into Kabul and seized power in August 2021. "If I was in Afghanistan now, I would not be alive today, for sure," said Nilofer.

Last year, Afghanistan topped Open Doors World Watch List as the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian. Today, the Afghan church is depleted and hidden, suffering intense persecution. Taliban soldiers roamed villages, going door-to-door in search of believers and unleashing violent attacks.

Girls no longer attend school, and women who refuse to wear the hijab are beaten, even killed. But you chose to stand with our Afghan brothers and sisters when it mattered most. Your prayers give strength and courage to the Christians who remain. Open Doors partner Hana said, "Afghan believers carry the responsibility to be the light of Christ in a very dark world, and many die for their faith."

She added, "Christians in this country stay to be the light of Christ and so God will bless their homeland. Even if their fellow citizens are hostile toward them.

"Though there are only a handful of believers, God has been faithful to them. He answers their prayers, gives them strength to endure suffering, and He leads the global Church, like you, to pray."

Your gifts also provide vital practical help to Christian refugees. Open Doors partner Miranda visited families sheltering in an apartment together, in a secret location. "All of them sold everything they owned to come here," said Miranda. "But life is difficult. They are professional doctors and nurses, but they cannot work, and must pay to renew their refugee status every year."

One believer said, "You came to help us, you have not let us disappear into the darkness." Your gifts supply food and essentials to families in need – and, above all, your support means Afghan Christians know they are not alone.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Persecution of Christians remains at a high level, and there are fears this will worsen amid the ongoing unrest. After Omar al-Bashir was ousted in April 2019, Sudan's transitional government introduced exciting changes to the legal framework guaranteeing basic human rights for all, no matter their ethnicity, gender, or religion.

However, mass protests led to the resignation of the then Prime Minister in January 2022, and there are fears that

Sudan will return to the authoritarian years of the former president.

Social attitudes towards Christians have not changed. Christians are still vulnerable to extreme persecution from both their communities and their own families, particularly if they have converted from Islam. Converts may face sexual assault and domestic violence in their homes, as well as being vulnerable to imprisonment.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

In recent years, India has seen an increase in Hindutva, an ideology that believes only Hindus are true Indians, and that Christians and other religious minorities must be expelled. Many states are implementing anti-conversion laws, which are used as an excuse to harass and intimidate Christians.

Christians experience social exclusion in their communities, discrimination in the workplace, and have false accusations spread about them.

For protection over church leaders and their families.

Those most at risk have come to faith from a Hindu background. Many face constant pressure to return to Hinduism, social exclusion, discrimination at work, physical assaults, and are sometimes even killed.

Church leaders are particularly vulnerable; being a pastor is one of the riskiest vocations in the country today. Hindu extremists target them, their wives, and children with violent attacks to sow fear in the wider Christian community.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Years of conflict and instability have created an environment in which persecution can flourish. Most church buildings have either been **demolished** or **repurposed** as Islamic centres. Public expressions of Christian faith are prohibited.

Conversion and evangelism are seen as a threat to social stability. Christians from a Muslim background experience particular **pressure from their families** and communities because their conversion is seen as a slight to the family's honour.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Saudi Arabia is a highly conservative Islamic nation, and other religions **cannot be practised openly**. No official churches of any Christian denomination are allowed.

Most Christians are migrant workers from Asia and Africa, but there are also a small number of Saudi Christian converts. Conversion from Islam to Christianity is unacceptable under Islamic law, so many live as secret believers. Those whose faith is discovered face **severe pressure**, especially from their families.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Since the military took control in February 2021, fighting has increased. The Christian minority bears the brunt of these attacks. More Christians than ever have become internally displaced and live in camps or churches without adequate food and healthcare. Churches, pastors, and Christian aid workers are attacked.

Converts to Christianity are shunned from community life. Communities make life for Christian families impossible by barring their access to community water resources.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

The government boasts that the country is 100% Muslim, so any deviation is taken seriously. If a Christian is discovered, they are likely to be reported to authorities, can be stripped of their citizenship, or even given the death penalty.

The Maldives is made up of close-knit communities, making it difficult to talk to or meet up with anyone secretly. Christian faith must be kept so private that two members of the same family could be believers without the other ever knowing.

Tightening restrictions and increasing surveillance are putting Christians in China under intensifying pressure, as the Communist Party seeks to limits all threats to its power. Surveillance in China is among the most oppressive and sophisticated in the world, and Christian leaders are particularly vulnerable to persecution, including **imprisonment** or, in a small number of cases, abduction.

It remains illegal for under-18s to attend church. Many churches are being

monitored and closed, no matter whether they are independent or belong to the Three-Self Patriotic Movement (statemonitored churches).

Those who convert from other religions also face persecution. If a convert from Islam or Tibetan Buddhism is discovered by their family or community, they are usually

threatened and physically harmed

- all in an effort to win them back to their original faith.



Violent Islamic extremist groups, including a branch of al Qaeda, are active in parts of the country, posing a danger to any Christians discovered there.



The ongoing conflict in Central African Republic (CAR) since 2013 has resulted in thousands of Christians losing their homes and livelihoods, and many continue to live in camps for internally displaced people. Most of the country is occupied by armed militia groups who are responsible for a range of human rights abuses.

When Christian leaders have publicly denounced the violence, they've been threatened, and their churches ransacked and torched.

Churches are the target of police **raids**, which may result in those attending being **arrested or fined**. Fines can be issued for holding illegal gatherings, possessing religious literature, and even for downloading Christian songs.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Christians from Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, or tribal backgrounds experience the most severe persecution. Such believers can encounter **restrictions**, **discrimination**, **and even attacks**. Gatherings with other Christians are often done in secret.

Protestant churches that engage in outreach among Muslim communities can also face persecution. Church leaders in particular are at **risk of arrest**. The arrest of church leaders can destabilise Christian

communities and make them feel afraid to gather for worship.

Christian women and girls are highly vulnerable to persecution -- particularly converts, who are deemed to have 'betrayed' their culture and religion. This persecution can include harassment, sexual, physical, and emotional abuse, forced marriage or divorce, house arrest, and abduction.



WHAT'S LIFE LIKE **FOR CHRISTIANS?**

Indonesia has taken on a more conservative **Islamic** character in recent years, which puts pressure on Christians, especially those from Muslim backgrounds.

Indonesians brought up as Muslims who become Christian believers will likely face disapproval and rejection, verbal abuse, and social isolation. In some cases, families will withdraw all support, and married women may keep their new faith secret to avoid the threat of their husbands divorcing them. Some women are faced

with lots of psychological abuse, including death threats, for practising Christianity.

If a church is seen to be preaching and spreading the gospel, they soon run into opposition from Islamic extremist groups, especially in rural areas. In some regions of Indonesia, non-traditional churches struggle to get permission for church buildings, with the authorities often ignoring their paperwork.

For a more open and tolerant society towards Christians in Indonesia. That God would comfort those rejected by their own families for His sake. For local partners helping displaced Christians find new homes and jobs.



WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Qatari believers are few in number and keep their faith secret. Almost all Qatari Christians converted abroad, and most do not return to the country out of fear. Converts from Islam face severe persecution, including **harassment**, **police monitoring**, **loss of status**, **and legal problems**.

Migrant workers, who make up the majority of the Christian population in Qatar, are not free to openly practice their faith. Telling a Muslim about Jesus can lead to **prosecution and deportation.**

Christian women risk **kidnapping**, sexual **abuse**, and **forced marriage**. There is little chance of justice through the legal system, and many Christians have been forced to **flee** their homes to safer villages.

Political instability contributes to the **lack of justice** when several pastors and priests

have been kidnapped and held to ransom, badly beaten, or killed.

The gangs, as de facto authorities in the most neglected areas, also give **fines** and extort money from church leaders, believing they must have access to some church funds. Christian leaders and their families are at high risk of **violence**, **recruitment**, **sexual harassment**, **abduction**, **and forced displacement**, as well as other forms of **abuse**.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Christianity may be the majority religion, but Islamic oppression is the main driver of persecution. People who convert to Christianity from Muslim backgrounds risk harsh mistreatment from their communities, including being forced to **flee** from their homes, and even **death threats.**

There is also persecution for Christians who move from a traditional Ethiopian Orthodox Church background to a Protestant or non-traditional denomination. They are likely to be **shunned** by their families.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Bhutanese citizens are expected to follow Buddhism. Converts to Christianity can be exposed to **harsh treatment** from their family and local community in attempts to pressure them into **renouncing their faith.**

No churches have official state recognition, meaning that any Christians holding a service together are worshipping illegally. Local authorities often refuse to issue Christians with the certification needed for things such as **employment and registering property.**

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Nationalism and Islam are intrinsically linked in Turkey, and anyone who is not a Muslim is seen to be a disloyal Turk. Aggressive rhetoric from the government has left less space for other voices and perspectives, such as Christianity. Believers are not regarded as **full members** of Turkish society.

They have **limited access** to state employment and experience **discrimination** in private employment, especially where employers have ties to the government.

Since religious affiliation is still recorded on ID cards (nowadays via electronic chip), it is easy to discriminate against Christian job applicants.

Although conversion from Islam to Christianity is not legally forbidden, converts are put under pressure by their families and communities to return to Islam. If their faith is discovered, they may be threatened with **divorce** and the **loss of inheritance rights.**

That converts whose families have rejected them will feel loved and accepted by God.

For the government to make policies that recognise Christians as equal to Muslims.

For opportunities for Christians to share Jesus safely with friends and family.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

In Comoros, choosing to leave Islam to follow Jesus is so risky that those who do so have little option but to keep their faith secret. In some parts of the country, **extremist** groups threaten believers with **violence**. In others, it can lead to **prosecution**.

It is illegal for followers of any religion except Islam to evangelise, so any Christian who shares their faith could face **legal consequences.** This will likely involve a **fine** and up to a year in prison.



WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Anybody who comes to know Jesus from a Muslim background is at risk for persecution by their family, community, and the authorities. They may be **arrested**, **interrogated**, **imprisoned**, or even sentenced to **death** if their faith is discovered.


All Christians are **monitored**, but non-traditional Protestant groups are purposely targeted with the aim of breaking them up, since they tend to attract more converts and be more active in sharing the gospel with Muslims.



WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Tajikistan has the highest percentage of Muslims in Central Asia. Christians from a Muslim background face rejection and sometimes violent assault from family and the local community to return to Islam.

Church services are often disrupted and believers face harassment and arrests for holding private prayer meetings or possessing any Christian material. Registering churches is effectively impossible, making all Christian activities carried out by these groups technically illegal.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

In Cameroon, those who convert to Christianity from Islam are not free to express or share their faith, and doing so can bring **hostility** from family and the local community. They are at great risk if they are even discovered to own a Bible.

The influence of Islamic extremists has hindered the activities of many churches. The ongoing civil war that's been fought since 2017 has made leaders who speak out against violence a target for separatist groups and the government.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

It is increasingly challenging for Christians to express and share their faith in Brunei. Conversion from Islam is **illegal**, meaning converts can face enormous **pressure to renounce their faith** in Jesus.

Since Protestant Christian groups cannot be registered as churches but only as secular organisations, they are required to **submit** their financial and operational reports to the government each year. All church activities are **monitored** by the authorities and surrounding community.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Omanis who convert to Christianity face **pressure** from their families and, more widely, from society, to renounce their faith. They may be **expelled** from their home, and in some cases **lose their jobs. Disinheritance** and **losing custody** of children are common.

Expatriate Christian communities are tolerated, but experience **surveillance and restrictions.** All Christian organisations must register themselves, and their meetings are monitored to record if any Omanis are attending.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

When a Kazakh from a Muslim background becomes a Christian, they are at a high risk of being locked up by their families, kept from any other Christians, verbally and physically abused, and potentially cut off from their family and community.

Authorities monitor and raid meetings of Christians and may arrest, fine, detain, and imprison believers – particularly Christian leaders. Converts and church leaders are at particular risk of **losing employment** due to their faith.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Jordan is tolerant as long as everybody stays in their religion of birth. But for nontraditional churches, those perceived to be sharing the gospel, and people becoming believers from Muslim backgrounds, there is persecution.

Christian communities are monitored, and those from a Muslim background face beating, arrest, or even being killed. Believers from Muslim backgrounds have been subject to days of interrogation and beatings and are pressured to inform on other Christians.

WHAT'S LIFE LIKE FOR CHRISTIANS?

Churches in Nicaragua that speak out against injustice and human rights violations by the government are viewed as destabilising agents. This makes them a target for hostility, which can include intimidation, harassment, monitoring, arrests, and even attacks. Roman Catholic churches are particularly susceptible to opposition.

The government is particularly hostile to churches that provided shelter and care for people during the widespread protests

which broke out against the country's dictatorial regime in 2018. To this day, these churches are still experiencing retribution from the government, including **slander** and surveillance.

Meanwhile, recent elections and changes to the law have been used as a pretext to label church leaders as terrorists and coup-plotters. This has led to increasing **restrictions** on churches and other Christian organisations.

That those affected by government hostility will be healed of their ordeals.

That government opposition will not deter Christians from boldly sharing their faith.

That the Holy Spirit will prompt those in government to see Christians positively.
